# Plant and Produce Stall at School's 'Village Market'

This year it will be held on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> May from 11am at the Aston Clinton School. This is a village market organised by the school association. It is well supported by a range of stall holders and public from the village. It is a good opportunity for the Society to raise funds to support our Spring and Summer shows and also enable us to purchase items such as additional tables. Since this Village Market has been running our Society has always managed to sell a wide range of plants. By May many young plants grown from seed are saleable. We would be grateful if members would grow plants from seed this spring for us to sell. Examples are tomato plants; lettuces, cabbages, Brussel sprouts, Marrows and courgettes and bedding plants. Please bring as many plants as possible.

# Jobs to do in our gardens

Now is the time to prune your fruit trees and other flowering bushes in the garden. Continue to clear away last year's dead foliage from perennial plants. Remember that slugs eat the new shoots of delphiniums and lupins before they even appear above the surface so use a slug killer now. Sow tomato seeds in a quarter size plant tray and place in airing cupboard or Kitchen windowsill. Onion and Shallot sets should be planted now. If the ground is not prepared or too wet, plant the 'sets' in pots or trays and place in a cold greenhouse or sheltered position to develop roots and shoots and plant out when weather and soil is warmer.

# **Spring Show and Plant Sale**

Our Spring Show this year will be on **Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> April at Aston Clinton School**. It is not just a daffodil show but has classes for all the family to display a range of skills.

The schedule of classes will be similar to that in previous years and the full schedule will be available on our website. A hardcopy will be circulated to all members in due course.

Here is a list of the amendments to the schedule together with some of the changes that were introduced in 2014 just as a reminder (flagged "2014 change")-

# Section 1 (daffodils) -

Class 1 Grow for Show is Jetfire.

**Class 1A** 2014 change - A single daffodil in a pot not more than 6 inches (15cms) in diameter. Open to all children up to and including the age of 14. There will be a cash prize for 1st, 2nd and 3rd.

**Class 32 (The Village Six)** 2014 change To try and encourage more entrants, we are going to modify the class description so that it reads "Six cultivars (Exhibitor's choice), one bloom of each selected from Divisions 1 to 4, to be staged in two vases" rather than "Six *DISTINCT* cultivars (Exhibitor's choice), one bloom of each selected from Divisions 1 to 4, to be staged in two vases". This means you can display more than one stem of the same variety in the vases rather than six different cultivars. Any queries, please talk to Ken or Graham.

#### Class 34 (The Society's Bloom) is Red Devon

Class 35 - the seedling class will be replaced by two new classes as follows -

- Class 35a A single daffodil grown in a pot not more than 8 inches (20 cms) in diameter.
  - Divisions 1 4 exhibitor's choice
- **Class 35b** A single daffodil grown in a pot not more than 8 inches (20 cms) in diameter. Divisions 5 - 8 exhibitor's choice

Class 38 (Penrice Cup) is one bloom of Romance

Section 2 (Spring Flowers) -

No changes

Section 3 (Floral Art) –

**Class 52** the NOVICE class this year will read as follows – "**Flower arrangement in a shoe**". Maximum size 12" x 12" x 24" high. Any natural flowers and plant material may be used with suitable accessories. Not open to anyone who has previously gained a first prize in any floral art class at this show.

Class 55 Floral Art - the theme is "Afternoon Tea"

Section 4 (Domestic) -

**Class 66** – A 7 inch round fruit cake decorated for a celebration of the exhibitor's choice. The recipe is attached.

#### Section 5 (Children) –

**Class 68** 2014 change Children 5 or under - "Decorate a paper plate for Spring" has been *replaced* with "A finger painting on A4 paper entitled "A Riot of Colour".

**Class 73** Children 9 to 14 years photo class entitled "**What a Wonderful World**". Photo 6" x 4" (digital or nondigital).

# Section 6 (Handicraft) –

**Class 81 and 82** - same theme for both photo classes entitled "**A Landscape**". Photo size - 6" x 4" mounted not framed for class 81 (non-digital), and not to exceed 8" x 6" mounted not framed for class 82 (digital).

Please try to enter the show as a competitor, and encourage your children, grandchildren, and friends and neighbours also. **Entry night is on Thursday 9<sup>th</sup> April 6.00 – 7.45pm at the Anthony Hall.** Those of you who have trophies, please return them to Ken Halls by entry night at the latest.

If you have not entered before, there are a number of novice classes. If you need help to know what to enter and how to stage, please ask Ken Halls, Graham Thirkettle or one of the committee.

We are always very grateful for gifts for the raffle and any spare plants you might have for our popular plant stall. We also hope to have the usual commercial stalls.



# Recipe for 7 inch round fruit Cake

#### Class 66

Ingredients

100g / 4oz of butter

100g / 4oz Demerara sugar

3 eggs

- 1 tablespoon treacle
- 1/2 teaspoon almond essence
- 150g / 6oz plain flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon mixed spice
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 to 11/2 1b of mixed fruit
- 25g /1oz ground almonds
- 25g / 1oz glace cherries

#### Method

- 1. Cream together butter and sugar.
- 2. Beat the eggs lightly and stir into the creamed mixture with the treacle.
- 3. Sift flour and fold into mixture with spices.
- 4. Add essence, fruit, ground almonds and cherries.
- 5. Put the cake mixture into the prepared 7inch tin.
- 6. Bake in a slow oven 325° F (Gas Mark 2) for 1 hour then reduce to 300°F (Gas Mark 1) for a further 1¼ hours or until cooked.
- 7. Turn onto cooling tray and leave until cold.
- 8. Decorate for a celebration of your choice.
