Aldbury Morris Men

The Aldbury Morris is a traditional men-only side, members of the Morris Ring. During the summer months they dance Cotswold Morris and the occasional dance from other traditions. You can find them in some unspoiled corner of the Chilterns near the borders of Hertfordshire, Bedfordshire and Buckinghamshire, in close proximity to a pub. They also go on trips, so you may even be lucky enough to stumble upon them somewhere else in England... but usually in close proximity to a pub. Where they are also well known for cracking a tune or two in the bar afterwards...

They dance an eclectic mix of different Cotswold traditions (and the odd Border dance as well) with sticks and hankies and pints. Many of the side are also musicians and singers, so every Thursday evening in the season ends with a really good music session in the bar - the ratio of dancing to singing depending on the weather! In fact, many people have observed, perhaps unkindly, that they are better musicians than we are dancers!

Tree Health Survey

I have been asked to carry out a survey of disease infected trees in Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp.

Trees are a vital and much loved part of our lives. In towns and cities, trees bring nature right to our doorsteps, and in parks and open spaces help to create green and pleasant surroundings for leisure and relaxation. Trees are vital for wildlife too, providing birds, insects and mammals with a home and food. They are also part of our national history and heritage and play an important role in helping to regulate our climate, by cooling in hot weather, reducing flooding and soil erosion, and capturing and storing carbon. This survey is about the condition of our trees. In recent years the number of pests and diseases attacking trees has increased, leading to a decline in tree health and, in some cases, tree loss. In order to manage these problems most effectively we need to study our trees and record information about their condition and any pests and diseases that are found.

The main pests and diseases are affecting Oak, Ash and Horse Chestnut. Whilst I have a lot more details, I am asking help from Society members. If and when you see a tree suffering from say die back or holes in leaves or leaf discolouring, please let me know where, so that I can collect details and photographs for the data bank.

56th Summer Show and Fete

Once again our summer Show and Fete will be held in the grounds, some of the classrooms and in the Old Clock School at Aston Clinton School. As always this is very much a village event with a range of stalls and fete games. Teas and refreshments are available. Admission is £1 with children free. For those not away on holiday it makes a pleasant break in the summer holidays. This year, for the first time, we have managed to get the **'Aldbury Morris Men'** to come and give us a display. This is in addition to The Great Horwood Silver Band who regularly play for us at our show.

We want you to join in and there are plenty of classes – 143 in total – so there is something for everyone to have a go. All the classes are open, that is anybody may enter, except for 2 classes that are restricted to those who live in our three villages. The title for the main floral art class this year is **"Summer Holidays"**; for the photograph the subject is **"On my Travels"** and the children's photograph is **"My best Friend"** (pet or human).

The range of classes makes this a truly 'Old Style' Village show and fete. Please encourage your family, friends and neighbours, children and grandchildren to have a go. Entry is free but there is no prize money, just the joy of winning a certificate and perhaps a cup or shield. We do of course give prize money to the children. Container Gardening

Diane, our website guru, has suggested that we need hints and tips on container gardening, especially where vegetables are concerned. With smaller and smaller gardens, many people are turning to pots and containers to grow their trees, bushes, perennials, as well as vegetables. In some areas such as here, where the ground has a lot of chalk in it, there are plants such as Rhododendrons, Azaleas and some heathers where planting in pots is necessary.

The main problem with growing in pots and containers is watering. Often plants look ok and then after just one hot and sunny day, you go out and they are all drooping, and to judge the amount of water needed for the pot is difficult. Either the compost dries out or gets waterlogged. Hanging baskets are even more difficult to manage.

Personally, I am always looking for ways of reducing the number of pots, and yet I have over 30 pots on my back patio and more in the front and up the garden. Most of them are flowering plants and small bushes, and those planted with geraniums require little attention but watering even from a hose can be a chore.

With vegetables, watering is even more important. The gardening pundits, especially the TV programmes, make it seem easy with suggestions such as grow your new potatoes in a bucket for Christmas! It is not only watering but making sure they get enough light. Traditionally, the principle vegetable grown in pots is the tomato and I grow them regularly in the greenhouse, and I have also been successful with cucumbers and peppers. Nearly all vegetables can be grown in pots and containers, from potatoes through turnips, carrots, beans, and peas, to courgettes and marrows.

The skill is in the management of the planted pots making sure that they get enough water and nutrients. You cannot rely on natural rain and often it is not enough to wet the compost thoroughly. This is especially pertinent with potatoes which grow a large leaf cover so that little water gets into the pot and you end up with very small potatoes. If you are taking up growing in pots seriously, then perhaps installing a water system is the answer. A bit expensive to install but it will last several years.

To sum up, growing vegetables in pots can be made to work but needs close management of watering and supply of nutrients, and do expect smaller returns. A longer version of this article, with photographs, will appear on our website. We are also interested in your successes and failures.
