Spring Show 2018

Our Spring Show in 2018 will be on **Saturday 7th April** at Aston Clinton School. Here is a list of some of the proposed amendments to the schedule

Section 1 (daffodils) -

Class 1 Grow for Show is **Pipit.** Plant as many bulbs as possible in a pot measuring a maximum of 12 inches (30cms) in diameter. Judged for effect.

Single Bloom classes as follows:- 7,8,9,13,14,15,19,21,28,31,34,38 exhibitors may now enter

two entries per class. This will include all single bloom classes and the Village Pink, Society Bloom

and Penrice Cup

The rules on the Novice Class in Section One, daffodils has been changed to state that you can exhibit in the Novice section provided that you have not won this class two years in a row

Any queries, please talk to Graham.

Class 34 (The Society's Bloom) is Skype (two entries allowed)

Class 38 (Penrice Cup) is one bloom of Brackenhurst (two entries allowed)

Section 2 (Spring Flowers) -

Currently no changes

Section 3 (Floral Art) -

Class 52 the **NOVICE** class this year will read as follows – **Flower Arrangement in a basket**. Maximum size basket 30cms (12")

Class 55 Floral Art - the theme is "Spring Wedding"

Space provided will be 60cms (24") x 60cms (24") with height of 76 cms (30") our standard niche

Class 56 an arrangement in a flower pot

Arrangement not to be more than 30cms (12") wide.

Section 4 (Domestic) -

Class 66 Sticky Honey Cake (Recipe will be in the schedule). This replaces the Simnel cake.

Section 5 (Children) -

Class 73 Children 9 to 14 years photo class entitled "Your Garden". Photo 6" x 4"

Section 6 (Handicraft) -

Class 81 Coloured photograph "My Favourite Bloom." Not to exceed 8" x 6" mounted not framed. Entry must NOT be computer enhanced

Class 82 Coloured photograph "Spring Scene". Not to exceed 8" x 6" mounted not framed this may be computer enhanced

I am sure that you are all working in the garden when the sun shines, even if it is only in the greenhouse. Some seeds need sowing now including; tomato, cucumber and sweet peas. Now is the time to plant dormant and bare root trees and bushes, including fruit trees and bushes such as raspberry. Raspberry is suitable for that semi shaded position in the garden. I am converted to the later fruiting autumn raspberries because the pruning is simpler; you just have to cut down all stems in the early spring and they will grow and fruit on this year's growth. The picture shows my recently acquired Tibetan Cherry, bought

for its red bark. I have just planted it and will grow it on as a multi-stem bush. All these are ideal for small gardens. Ralph has written an article in the February Village Life that gives more suggestions for plantings for small gardens.

It is time to plant shallots and onions either outside or in pots in the greenhouse where they will establish a good root system. Traditionally, as Reg price always said, 'Shallots should be planted on the shortest day of the year and harvested



on the longest.' Depending on the weather other seeds such as parsnip and radishes will also be sown. In the meantime, the ground will have been turned over, spread with manure and cleansed of all weed.
