In your Garden

It may be the middle of winter and the weather has not been kind to us, however there is still plenty to do. As we approach the shortest day (21<sup>st</sup>), that is the time to plant your shallots. I don't suggest you put them direct into the ground but plant your shallot bulbs into small pots and keep them sheltered in a cold frame. There they will grow their roots and eventually start to shoot so that when you plant them out, they will have a head start. There are plenty of other jobs such as cleaning away the leaves and digging over your flower beds and when that has been done the green house will want sorting out and getting ready for planting all those seeds you have ordered from DT Brown's.

CLIMATE CHANGE - As we look forward to a new year in our gardens, I am conscious of the uncertainties in the weather. This month is no exception, with one day very wet, as on election day and the next, blue skies and bright sunshine leading to frosts. This is all caused by climate change. This last year has been kind to us in that we did not have months and months of hot dry weather. What will 2020 bring? I don't know, but we must be prepared for anything.

As you know I have a 'thing' about trees. Many people, including me, the scientists and the politicians (all parties have promised to plant millions of them), know that trees absorb carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. If we all planted a tree in our garden or close to our boundary then perhaps it will absorb the CO2 and nitro oxide from your car exhaust.

Back in 2008 the Society, with the help of members planted 50 field trees in Aston Clinton Park to celebrate our 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Most are still there today.

Some of the trees are now 20 to 30 feet high with good strong trunks and that is only after 11 years. Some like the oaks are not that tall yet. With a bit of luck, they will be there in 100 years' time absorbing the pollution **we** are putting in the atmosphere.

During the year, when I am out in the garden, I often hear the sound of chain saws cutting down trees and these need to be replaced. Whilst I don't think your Society could plant another 50 trees today - we are all 11 years older, we need to encourage the wider public in Aston Clinton to do so. It is too late for this season but we need to plan for Autumn 2020.
