New Elm Trees - Ulmus New Horizon.

As many of you already know from previous articles and from reading the latest Village life, the Horticultural Society has acquired five virus resistant Elm trees.

We have permission to plant them in the park. One tree will be planted by the other commemorative trees as a thank you to NHS for their work this year in combating the Coronavirus. Two more will be planted to the front of the new Pavilion and the last two will replace trees from our collection that have died.

I think it is quite fitting that these trees be planted in the park. Not only will they replace elm trees in this village that died of 'Dutch Elm disease', but as virus resistant trees they have been grown from stock that have been vaccinated. Whilst we are waiting for a vaccine for the Coronavirus, we can watch these trees grow. It has taken many years to develop a vaccine for elm trees and I remember whilst on a garden holiday in Holland in the 1970's reading about experiments to develop resistant trees. In the meantime, we must await a vaccine for the Coronavirus.

I have arranged to pick up the trees from the supplier in mid-November when they are fully dormant as they are 'bare-root' trees. Once back in Aston they will be heeled in the ground until they can be planted.

I am looking for volunteers to assist the planting of these 5 trees in November. This will include digging out a hole for each tree, preparing the soil, knocking in the supporting stakes as can be seen in the picture.

I am also looking for sponsors for the stakes themselves Each pair will cost approximately £10 per tree. Does anyone know the best place to get the stakes from? If you can help please contact Ralph on 01296 630456 or email

My harvest has been pretty good this year and I have a photo to show the range of produce. Since then, I have been harvesting apples and pears. Some of the apples are huge. I still have leeks, curly Kale and brussel sprouts growing. So the lockdown has done me some good.

Planting of bulbs in and around the Village.

Some months ago Joanna Brown, who lives in the village proposed that the villagers planted daffodil bulbs as a thank you to the NHS for their efforts in supporting people suffering from the Coronavirus.

As a result, the Horticultural Society paid for 5 bags of Rainbow daffodils (as illustrated in the photo opposite). Joanna contacted many people and organisations in the village and, as a consequence, Graham Thirkettle ended up ordering some 10000 bulbs in sacks of 300 for the village to plant. Graham then went on to assist in their planting around the village and the Parish church. So, next April time the village, and especially the park, will be filled with the colour and beauty of Rainbow and other varieties of daffodil. Make sure you go out and see them. The picture on page 5 shows a guide leader using a long handled planter to make the hole for the Brownie to plant her bulbs.

I cannot thank or emphasise enough the contribution that Graham has made to this project because not only has he



been involved in the ordering, delivery and distribution but has helped plant several thousand bulbs as well. Thank you, Graham.
